Christ the King

We have very little experience with kings. In our time Queen Elizabeth was a figurehead, rather than a ruler. This last Sunday in Pentecost is Christ the King Sunday. When the people of Israel demanded a king (like all the other countries) God tried to dissuade them saying that He was their king and that an earthly King would only bring taxes and take their sons into the army to fight wars and their daughters into the court to serve him. They wanted a king. They got King Saul, who later went insane, and then he was succeeded by King David, who united the country and was faithful to God. David, of course, had Jesus as his descendant. After David the kingship alternated between followers of God and those who allowed pagan worship to return to the country. The Apostle's Creed says that when Jesus ascended into heaven he is seated at the right hand of the Father. We assume that he is seated on a throne. The presumption is that the Father, Son and Holy Spirit are actively ruling the world. Jesus did not ascend into heaven to play a harp and relax. On Christ the King Sunday we acknowledge that Jesus Christ, fully human and fully divine, is next to the Father interceding on behalf of the world until the time that He returns. Ally +

Hymn Notes

This week's Hymn Notes should probably be renamed "HIM" notes. Yesterday – the day after Veterans Day – I was all set to write the hymn history of "We Gather Together" or "Come, Ye Thankful People, Come.," but I was too tired last night to get to the computer. Then several things that have happened during the past week jelled today when I was having lunch with Dan and Paulina Gilliland after our morning worship service. Dan is the baritone who shared his musical gifts with us today. Many of you asked how Dan and I met; he and I reminisced about that. I knew that I had to change the direction of this article and write about a man who influenced both our lives. If you had been living in Selma during the last half of the twentieth century, you would have seen a man in a wheelchair sitting on the corner of Broad Street and Dallas Avenue and waving to the passersby. That man was our friend Clifford Morrison. Clifford was born in 1938 with cerebral palsy and related congenital defects. His body was terribly twisted and one could understand his speech sometimes by looking away from him. He never ceased trying to communicate. During a time when many with disabilities were put away in institutions, Clifford was encouraged to learn and to become a part of the church. With the advent of computers, he had a vehicle with which to research, communicate, and even create. Clifford and I became dear friends while I served as Organist-Minister of Music at First Presbyterian Church. It was Clifford who taught me to love the stories behind the hymns. He wrote a monthly hymn article for our church's newsletter. Because he couldn't always type what he meant, I proofed each article. Clifford loved the pipe organ at the church. Whenever I played Widor's "Toccata," he would sit in open doorway to the choir loft and literally jump out of his wheelchair with delight. He loved to swim, for there he felt free. It was while he was attending Camp ASCCA that he met Dan Gilliland. At Clifford's insistence I invited Dan to sing at First Pres. We became fast friends. Over the years Clifford wrote a Camp Meeting service for the church and a Hymn Festival based on American hymnody. He spear-headed campaigns to install a carillon in the church's clock tower, urged a family to gift the church with a grand piano for the choir room, and led the charge to get a new console costing \$125,000 for the pipe organ there. He served as an Elder, a member of the Session. On Christmas Eve he was able to balance the plate with the Host in his lap. He was a man who graciously accepted his condition in life and NEVER used it as an excuse to avoid service. He loved His Lord and the Church; his life was a witness to so many.

During last Wednesday's Bible Study at Holy Trinity in Auburn we discussed singing praises to God. (We were studying the Psalms.) Someone said they didn't sing in church because they could not carry a tune. I and Karen Porter (another transplanted Selmian) said, "The scriptures just say "make a joyful noise." I told the story of Clifford. When we sang hymns, Clifford gave his all. His words were usually not understandable and the pitches were questionable, but I know that his singing thrilled the heart of God. It was straight from the soul of one who loved God with his entire being! During the coming days when you are feeling overwhelmed, follow Clifford's example. Don't dwell on what you do not have. Instead count your blessings, give thanks to God, and use what you have to serve Him - our Creator, our Sustainer, our resurrected Savior. As Dan and I were talking today, we were both reminded of a verse of one of Clifford's favorite hymns, "O for a thousand tongues to sing." I loved this verse the moment I first sang it, but it took on special meaning when I got to know Clifford:

Hear Him, ye deaf; ye voiceless ones Your loosened tongues employ; Ye blind, behold your Savior comes; And leap, ye lame, for joy!
